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FROM THE PRESIDENTS DESK

ELECTIONS AND OTHER ISSUES

The week started with the threat of disruption in Lae. The Police received a letter from the Unitech students during the Easter weekend, to request permission to march from Taraka to Lae on Tuesday to conduct awareness at the Niall Reserve over the Election and Judiciary concerns. The Police were hesitant to give permission as there are still issues left over from last Novembers riots. After insistence from the students and promises that the event would be conducted peacefully, the Police agreed to allow the march to proceed.

The Police contacted me over the weekend to advise members of this event. They also wanted assistance with fuel, as due to administrative reasons the Police fuel funds had run out. The Lae Chamber had already assisted the Police with fuel over the Easter break. Even though the students promised not to cause trouble, it was imperative that the Police were kept mobile during this demonstration, as there was no guarantee that opportunists would not cause strife. Fortunately the Chemcare group came to the rescue of the Police and opened the bowsers at Freddy's Family Store for the Police to fill up on Tuesday. Amalpak were able to help refuel two Strategic Police Operational vehicles.

We were very pleased that there was no trouble on Tuesday and it is a credit to the students and their leaders that they were able to keep a tab on this event. The idea of making the public more aware of what their parliamentary leaders are doing was indeed a very responsible and worthy stand by the students. The fact that the public showed little interest is probably a lethargic reaction to the constant barrage of new Parliamentary acts and reversals by the Politicians. The lack of real interest no doubt helped keep the event trouble free.

The LCCI believes that the National Elections should be held without unnecessary delays. To postpone the elections will see a continuation of political uncertainties that are becoming almost a daily occurrence. Political stability is paramount to good business and is the hallmark for future investment from both domestic and international sources. If the Electoral Commission believes there are flaws with the Lae Common Roll, then we can assist by using our extensive network, as has already been offered.


- Obtain a CT Scanner

REGIONAL TSUNAMI WARNING SYSTEMS

Australian Government - AusAID Media Release – 13TH April 2012

Australian Foreign Minister Bob Carr today said the value of investing in regional Tsunami early warning systems was confirmed following this week's earthquakes off the coast of Sumatra, Indonesia.

Senator Carr said Australia's regional neighbours received an Indian Ocean wide tsunami warning just seven minutes after the 8.5 magnitude earthquake occurred at 6:38pm Australian Eastern Standard Time on Wednesday 11 April.

'Early warning systems are critical to saving lives and to reducing the risks and costs of natural disasters caused by tsunamis.

'Our region gets more than its share of natural disasters and early warning systems are now agreed as essential to limiting their impacts.'

Senator Carr was speaking at a United Nations General Assembly debate on Disaster Risk Reduction where he praised the partnership between Australia and Indonesia in managing the risk of disasters in the region.

'It was a great relief to all Australians and our regional neighbours when the Joint Australian Tsunami Warning Centre issued a nil tsunami threat for Australia within 24 minutes of the earthquake.

'I am advised by the Joint Australian Tsunami Warning Centre, which is operated by Geoscience Australia and the Bureau of Meteorology that all warnings issued as part of the Indian Ocean Tsunami Warning System were delivered within normal operational timeframes.

'Following the devastating tsunamis in the Indian Ocean in 2004 and in Japan last year, the international community has become acutely aware of the value of investing in disaster risk reduction.

'Australia is a strong supporter of international efforts to reduce the risk that natural disasters pose in developing nations - particularly countries in our region.

'In May 2005, following the Indian Ocean tsunami, the Australian Government committed \$69.8 million over four years (2005-09), to the Australian Tsunami Warning System initiative.

'This initiative:

- provides a comprehensive tsunami warning system for Australia
- supports establishment of an Indian Ocean tsunami warning system
- helps facilitate a tsunami warning system for the South West Pacific

'Through the Australia-Indonesia Facility for Disaster Reduction, the Australian aid program has provided support to Indonesia's Disaster Management Agency (BNPB) and Meteorology, Climatology and Geophysics Agency (BMMKG) to assist in quickly estimating the impact of earthquakes.

'In eastern Indonesia, Australia is also supporting a program with funding of \$1 million to assist communities to identify priorities for disaster risk reduction through mapping the parts of their community that are particularly vulnerable to natural disasters using a free 'wiki-map'.

'And in the Pacific, Australia has upgraded equipment at monitoring stations in 12 countries to strengthen tsunami warning capacity and measure sea level changes,' Senator Carr said.



In view of the standoff between the PNG Government and some of the Contractors on the Lae City Roads Rehabilitation Project (LCRRP) the Lae Chamber of Commerce arranged a meeting of the contractors and the acting First Assistant Secretary (Operations) of the Department of Works, last Tuesday. In arranging this meeting we were mindful of the threat to close roads that the contractors have been working on, in an effort to force the Government to pay the substantial backlog of unpaid claims.

The Contractors that came to the meeting were – FTM Construction, R & Sons Construction, Dekenai Construction and Cameron Construction. Mr. Brian Alois, the a/FAS of DOW promised to return to DOW Headquarters and see if he could sort out the unpaid claims. We will continue to keep in contact with Mr. Alois to check on the progress.

Our main objective is to get the work on the roads started again and finished off. We do appreciate the newly finished roads but we also realise that the unfinished sections will deteriorate in the rainy season and we could be worse off than before the road-works started.

The site's gases operations were unaffected in the incident, meaning the supply of specialty medical and industrial gases will continue as

The main administration building comprising the finance, IT and Senior Management sections was also unaffected.

Unfortunately, some of our welding and safety customers may be impacted, depending of product availability.

However, BOC does have back up stock at our other warehouses in PNG, one nearby in Lae and the other in Port Morseby. BOC has also taken immediate action to import fast moving product from across our BOC network in the South Pacific to ease demand.

This week, BOC is sourcing temporary Gas & Gear and warehouse space in Lae and will keep customers advised when we acquire these essential properties.

All of our customers' embroidery requirements will be completed locally in PNG, either at Port Moresby by BOC or outsourced as needed.

BOC apologises to its customers for any inconvenience these unforeseen circumstances may cause.

BOC is treating this incident with the highest priority and is acting quickly to re-establish our normal capabilities in Lae. We will ensure we keep our customers updated with the latest information as it comes to hand.
