# Gamato: Ruling will boost squatters

A SUPREME Court decision over an eviction exercise on illegal settlements is posing problems for urban authorities.

Morobe provincial acting administrator Patilias Gamato said yesterday illegal settlements sprouting up around urban areas in the province was hindering proper planning and expansion of the city while providing a breeding ground for criminals. A recent Supreme

Court decision dismissed

an appeal by the provincial government over an eviction exercise carried out in January 2002.

The Supreme Court comprising Justice David Cannings, George Manuhu and Steven Kassman backed a National Court decision earlier and ruled that an eviction programme at Yonggo Mountain, 2-Mile in Lae was "harsh, oppressive, inhuman and not reasonably justifiable in a democratic society".

Gamato said he wel-

comed the decision but questioned the extent to which the Supreme Court defined a "harsh and oppressive eviction".

"The Land Act says the provincial government is the 'leader, caretaker and responsible authority' to ensure its citizens are taken care of in a manner which is possible and in accordance with set guidelines to protect their rights," Gamato said.

The provincial government had acted on requests from community leaders as well as regulations covering the demarcation of urban zones from customary land in the 2002 case.

He said community leaders were asking for the removal of such settlements believed to be breeding grounds for criminals.

Gamato said the Morobe provincial government was trying to establish an office for 'settlement and urbanisation' to ensure proper services were delivered to settlements.

You may have seen this article in Tuesdays National Newspaper. The matter that the article refers to is an eviction exercise against settlers on Government Land in the 2-3 mile area of Lae in 2002. The squatters, on receiving an order to vacate the land signed by the Morobe Provincial Administrator, obtained a restraining order against being removed. The matter went to the National court which ruled against the evictions and this article refers to how the Supreme court has dismissed a subsequent appeal lodged by the provincial government.

When Lae was terrorised in November last year, one of the petitioned items from the Morobean youth was to rid the city of illegal settlers. Unfortunately with this decision of the Supreme Court, getting rid of unwanted settlers is made more difficult.

There are areas of vacant land in Lae that have been settled that are downright dangerous – I refer to drainage reserves including the banks of the Bumbu River and Didiman Creek. If the settlements are allowed to develop further in these areas, then what will happen when the next flood occurs and washes all the houses and dwellers away? Who will be blamed? The city planners created these reserves for a purpose and they must be kept free of residents – both illegal and legal, for the sake of their own safety.

As Mr. Gamato said settlements have become a breeding ground for criminals and the officials should have the capability to control them. Otherwise the illegal settlers and criminals will take over the city.

### LAE ROADS

The funding problem with the Lae Roads has not yet been resolved. The work on the contracts under the Lae City Roads Rehabilitation Project (LCRRP) has all but stalled with some of the contracted sections not complete. Whilst we do benefit from the smoother and safer roads that have been completed, there are congestion problems caused by the roads not yet finished. From our perspective these sections must be completed – they just cannot be left as they are with water filled ponds between completed cement segments.

The frustrated contractors have not been paid for work performed, some for many months and they sent a delegation to Port Moresby to raise their case with the Project Engineers, Finance Department, the Treasury and Government Ministers, and they have received promises but so far no funding. These contractors are making noises to block off all the roads that they have been working on. If this occurs then the whole city will be in shut down. The unfortunate thing is that the travelling public will again suffer, as they will become the pawns in the battle between the contractors and the Government.

### LCCI ANNUAL GENERAL MEETING

Take care in LAE at the moment as there have been a number of incidences of crime.

Whilst we provide the notification service to keep members aware of criminal activities and crime HOT SPOTS in the Lae City, this is done so members can take necessary precautions. It does not necessarily mean that Lae is infested with criminals or that crime is out of control.

### **CRIME IN THE CITY**

We have discussed the crime situation in and around Lae with the Metropolitan Commander of Police, who believes that the Police are coping fairly well with the crime in the city but are struggling with the incidents on the fringes of the city, because of a severe lack of mobility.

Even though the reports that we are receiving indicate that there is a fair increase in criminal activity, the Police state that there is no real spike showing from their records. I believe that there is a higher rate of crime reports coming in which can only help us when presenting our case for better law enforcement. We do advise that we are monitoring al the reports that we have been receiving and will use the figures when dealing with the Law & Order requirements in the city. The other thing is that some crimes may not be reported.

The following are reports of recent incidents reported by Guard Dog Security services in the city:

- Zero City at ERIKU was held up this morning between 8.30 8.45am by 8 thugs who went into the Shop dressed like females....
- Yesterday at about 11:30 AM in top town at the car park opposite Westpac Bank, a lady got out of the vehicle she had just parked and was approached by a gang of 4 well dressed men all with backpacks on. Two of the men walk towards the passenger side and the other two walked straight to the unfortunate lady and one thick-set man actually bumped into her and demanded the car keys. Feigning that she needed space to get the car key, she pushed him towards the ditch and ran for safety, straight to-wards the police station. When she returned with a policeman the gang had gone.

These incidents highlight that the criminals are highly active during the day, even with large numbers of people around. They are also using different tactics to get easier access to properties. We advise that all security measures are to be taken and for everyone to be extremely vigilant at all times. We will continue to press the police to improve their effectiveness. We will also follow up on our submission to the Government to properly fund the Police and build up their numbers and capacity.
