Welcome to Lae Member and Governor

We were lucky to have the opportunity to attend the welcoming function for the Lae Open Member and Minister for Religion, Youth & Community Development Loujaya Toni yesterday, attended as well by the new Governor Kelly Naru which was a real bonus.

The member for Lae started her speech by stating how she intended to work closely with the Private Sector through the Lae Chamber of Commerce and the PNG Indigenous Council. The LCCI has been fortunate to have had a good working relationship with the previous Member for Lae Open Bart Philemon and through our representative Nigel Merrick, the LCCI played an active and significant role in the Lae JDP&BPC. We certainly look forward to continuing and expanding on this relationship with the new Lae Open member, which will benefit the Lae Private Sector and the City as a whole.

Ms. Toni carried a message from the Prime Minister that the Lae City Roads Rehabilitation Project (LCRRP) will be completed and that she will work closely with the incoming Governor to upgrade other City and Provincial Roads.

Ms. Toni spoke of her plans to work on a wide range of issues for the benefit of the citizens of Lae, including furthering plans to upgrade the Angau Memorial Hospital. We certainly wish the member well in her endeavours and we will provide advice and assistance wherever we can.

The Governor in a short welcoming speech to the Lae Member mentioned that he will be looking seriously into the increasing crime problems and ways to combat these, which is welcome news indeed. The Governor promised that as soon as his immediate Parliamentary obligations are dealt with, he will make himself available to discuss City and Provincial concerns with the Chamber of Commerce.

Work has thankfully restarted on some of the stalled Lae Roads again. The sketch to the right is from East West #1 the contractor who is currently concreting the Chinatown Roundabout. This sketch shows the segments that will be concreted separately. The right hand lanes will remain open whilst the left hand lanes are being concreted and go through the curing process.

Kingfisher Street has been graded to allow for light traffic to travel, but heavier traffic can use the Right hand lanes as displayed.

It is believed that the other Lae Road contractors will recommence work soon, on the other roads where the work was stopped due to lack of funding.

The presentation by the Vice Chancellor of the University of Technology Dr. Albert Schram Lae on Thursday was definitely worth hearing. There are very positive things happening on the campus which will result in the facility functioning better and providing a more rounded education to the students.

The benefit to companies in Lae is that the door is now well and truly open for further discussion on courses, programs and the opportunities to the private sector, through recruitment of graduates, the chance of putting students on scholarships or making input into the content of courses.

The Vice Chancellor brought along Mr. Harry Sakalus who is the Head of the Environment Department. Harry advised the plans that are being formulated for the future of the Rain Forest Habitat, which involve maintenance, leasing out facilities, sponsorships and better management. Whilst there was some discussion as whether there is a more preferable location for the Habitat, it is good that Unitech is accepting the value of this facility to Lae, and has plans to re-furbish the establishment.

After the formal presentation Dr. Schram, Harry Sakalus and the a/Deputy Vice Chancellor Cletus Gonduan made themselves available to discuss matters on a one on one basis. 




Seminar on an Automated Inter-Bank Payment System for Papua New Guinea and Extending Financial Inclusion

Have you ever been concerned about Jelly Fish in PNG Waters

Office

Have you ever wondered whether or not box jellyfish were found in the waters around PNG. After some web based research and an email exchange with the PNG Surfers Association, the answer is yes, they do.

My advice for anyone entering the waters in this tropical environment is to wear a stinger suit. Box jellyfish can be lethal, and at the very minimum, cause extreme pain and distress, with the possibility of long term scarring.

The other dangerous jellyfish which we share with Australia is the Irukanjii. This was thought not to be as dangerous as the box jellyfish, but there have certainly been deaths associated with it in recent years.

As in Australia, these jellyfish will have some degree of seasonal variability, but with northern and southern coastlines, differing currents and weather patterns, this cannot be relied on in determining whether it is safe to enter the water without protection in PNG. My advice is, wear a stinger suit. Feel free to contact me if you have questions. Dr Ross Atkinson
