FROM THE PRESIDENTS DESK

ETHNIC UNREST

This week we saw the renewed clash between certain ethnic groups again in Lae. This seems to be the prolongation of the problems that brought the City to a standstill almost exactly 18 months ago. This time it was triggered off by a bus driver and crew who seriously molested and assaulted a woman passenger, and when a young seminary student tried to save her, he was set upon and thrown to his death from the bus. A resultant fight occurred and several buildings were burnt in the back road settlement, and an unrelated bus was set fire to and demolished.

By Tuesday there were no buses operating in Lae City as the operator's feared retribution and destruction of their precious assets. On Wednesday most buses were back on the road, but only to as far as the Unitech gates and definitely not to the Malahang and Bumayong areas

The Morobean people expressed their exas peration for the lack of action to their demands of 1½ years ago, and insisted that they hand over a petition to the Governor at a demonstration they called for outside his office. The Police would not allow this mob to come into the dty and a dvised the Governor to travel to the Bumay ong a rea to take the petition there instead. To allow them into Lae could likely cause problems again with unruly and damaging behaviour.

Withdrawal of Buses

The business houses have all suffered this week due to this conflict. The withdrawal of all buses meant that many workers could not come to work and a lot of customers were left stranded with no means to get to the city. All retail stores lost customers — and will never pick up the lost sales again.

One of the demands from the Morobe petitioners is to take the bus PMV licenses from the hands of the Highlands group, expressly the Western Highlanders. They claim that the Western Highlanders dominate the buses in Lae, and that the population is at the mercy of these bus owners, every time they are involved in a clash. The petitioners demanded the PMV licences be issued to Morobe people only.

The Governor said his Government would issue instructions to the Morobe Land Transport Board consider a "Quota Allocation" system, whereby 60% of the PMV licenses would be reserved for Morobeans.

ETHNICPROBLEMS (Cont) - PMV Quota System

I can see the reason behind the Governors thinking, but the trouble is that a quota system guarantees the ownership will lay with people from one Province, which means that if this group is responsible for trouble in the future, buses may again be withdrawn from service.

It may be better to return to a Public Bus Service again as was operated in the 1970's, to be operated by the Province or the Urban Authority, or under a Public Private Partnership (PPP) arrangement, where shares are held by various private companies or individuals. Whichever way the Government decides to go, the move away from individual ownership by one group of people is possibly the best. A series of buses operated under proper central management control could ensure that all the worstthings that we see with the bus operators at the moment can be addressed:

- Operation of Road worthy buses in good mechanical condition
- Bus es clean ed each day
- Properly trained drivers, who know the road rules
- Drivers and crew who are clean and tidy, and in uniforms
- Appropriate Insurances for 3rd party accidents or passenger injuries
- No chewing betel nut, spitting or throwing items from wind ows
- et o

Other Issues

As far as I can see there are still unresolved issues in the city that were highlighted when the first violence occurred 18 months ago:

- The street gangs are still operating in shopping areas and bus stops, especially at Eriku. The public, in particular women are being harassed and threatened by thugs, stealing bags, mobile phones and other personal belongings as well as being sexually harassed. This can be prevented if there is more of a presence of the Gty Community Police at the hot spots in the city.
- Street sellers who very aggressively flog goods which are obviously stolen, should be removed or arrested
- The Lae City Markethas become overrun with illegal street sellers and gangs of bag snatches. The City Authority must take control of the marketagain to make it a safer place for the public and the produce sellers.
- The seemingly unresolvable problem associated with settlements & squatter camps

We are to sit down with the Governor at a working lunch soon and will be highlighting our concern over this current clash and other unresolved problems, in consideration to the disruption of business in the city.

The transformation of the Bemobile mobile phone company following last week's reported restructure has begun, with Bemobile's Regional CEO for Papua New Guinea and Solomon Islands, Pradeep Lal, already in PNG to take the reins.

The company's new CEO has hit the ground running, already identifying the key priorities.

There are some business imperatives for operating a mobile telecommunications business, which is no secret, 'Pradeep Ial told *Business Advantage PNG*. 'These include network infastructure, coverage and capacity issues. These are some immediate priority areas for the business we have identified which need urgent attention.'

The new ownership structure will also see the company rebanded:

Re-branding will commerce as soon as the intricacies have been worked out Branding is not an every day exercise and therefore we will take a very measured and practical approach to re-branding,' said Lal, who could not confirm how the new branding would look, except to confirm that 'Bemobile will remain part of any new re-branding exercise given the local peoples' affinity and love for the brand.'

A review of Bemobile's current products and services is also under way.

'We are reviewing the existing suite of products and services being offered to identify our strengths and also new opportunities available to the business,' he told *Business Advantage PNG*. 'Based on these findings, we will be offering more customized and tailor made products to suit the market needs.'

Lalalso said the company was currently interviewing 'some very qualified and experienced telecommunications executives' for senior management roles, a process expected to be completed over the next few days.

A new board for the company is also being put in place, with Andrew Johnson replacing Syd Yates as Chairman, Wasantha Kumarasiri and Paul Komboi representing the PNG Government's Independent Public Business Corporation and Ajith Kodagodaand Jaoji Koroi representing the Fiji National Provident Fund.

AUSTRALIA LE ADING THE FIGHT A GAINST HIV/AIDS

Australia strengthens leadership role in global HIV/AIDS fight

24 April, 2013

Australia will help spearhead the global fight against HIV and ADS following its appointment to a key leadership role on the United Nations body that aims to unite the world against AIDS.

 $Australia's Ambassad\sigma \ for\ HIV/AIDS,\ Malaria\ and\ Tuberculosis, Mr\ James\ Gilling,\ said\ Australia\ had been appointed Vice\ Chair\ of the\ Programme\ Co\sigma dinating\ Board\ of the\ Joint\ United\ Nations\ Programme\ on\ HIV/AIDS\ (UNAIDS)\ in\ 2013.$

'This is a key leadership role in the global response to HIV and AIDS, which ensures Australia is at the forefront of UNAIDS'efforts to achieve zero new HIV infections, zero discrimination and zero AIDS-related deaths,' Mr Gilling said.

Mr. Reter: Wool lott, Ambassador and Permanent Representative to the United Nations, Geneva, will represent Australia in the role of Vice Chair.

Mr Gilling also said that Australia would increase its influence through a second seat at the Programme Coordinating Boardduring 2013 and 2014, representing our constituency of five countries—Australia, Canada, Greece, New Zealand and Turkey.

These developments come as a senior delegation from UNAIDS visits Australia this week meeting AusAID and organisers of AIDS 2014, the 20th International AIDS Conference, being held in Melbourne in July next year.

'AIDS 2014will be the largest medical conference to be held in Australia and will bring together around 18,000 of the world's leading scientists, healthcare providers, public healthexperts, political, community and business leaders as well as the HIV-affected community,' Mr Gilling said. 'Australia is a strong supporter of the work of UNAIDS both globally and in the Asia Pacific region.'

CHIKUNGUNYA - FACT SHEET

"CHICKEN MALARIA OR TIGER MALARIA"

Chikungunya virus (CHIKV) is carried by infected mosquitoes. The virus causes high fever and severe joint pain that start suddenly. It can also cause headache, muscle pain and rash. Chikungunya (CHIK) does not often result in death, but the symptoms can be disabling, and some people may get severe complications.

Avoiding mosquito bites is the key to avoid chikungunya fever (CHIK).

HOW IS CHIKV SPREAD?

The virus is spread by bites from infected Aedes mosquitoes. If a person is infected and bitten by a mosquito, that mosquito may later spread the virus by biting another person.



These mosquitoes can be identified by the white stripes on their black bodies and legs. They are aggressive daytime biters, with peak feeding activity at dawn and dusk.

WHAT ARE THE SYMPTOMS?

Symptoms appear on average 3 to 7 days after being bitten by an infected mosquito. Most patients feel better after a few days or weeks. Some people may develop longerterm joint pain.

- Sudden onset of fever (>39°C)
- · Severe joint pain in arms and legs
- Headache
- Muscle pain
- Nausea
- Rash

TREATMENT

- No specific medication available
- No vaccine available
 Treat with anti-pyretics
 (e.g. Panadol) DO NOT TREAT WITH ASPRIN



HOW CAN I AVOID BECOMING INFECTED?

Avoid mosquito bites!

The following will help to reduce your chances of being bitten:

- . Wear long-sleeved shirts and long pants.
- Use mosquito repellent on exposed skin
- Install window screens on houses
- Also, a person with chikungunya fever should limit their exposure to mosquito bites to avoid further spreading the infection. The person should use repellents when outdoors or stay indoors in areas with screens or under a mosquito net.

HOW CAN I PROTECT MY COMMUNITY?

Aedes mosquitoes live in a wide range of habitats. Standing water is needed for mosquito eggs to develop into adults. Preventing standing water prevents Aedes mosquitoes. Standing water can collect in tires, flower pots, cans, drain pipes, and any other open containers.
